














Why is it important to teach PSHE?

At the Roebuck School, we know PSHE can play an important role in children's development. It will enable children to become healthy, independent and responsible members of society. It aims to help them understand how they are developing personally and socially, and tackles many of the moral, social and cultural issues that are part of growing up.





What does PSHE look like at the Roebuck School?

*Every child participates in one PSHE lesson per week.

*We emphasise active learning by including the children in discussions, investigations and problem-solving activities.

*Our school assemblies help us to understand British and school values.

*Through science lessons, children are taught about healthy eating.

*There is a large overlap between Religious Education and PSHE, so the aims of PSHE are delivered through our Religious Education lessons.











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
